Code 0 — Sound tooth surface; no evidence of caries after five seconds of air drying

Code 1 — First visual change in enamel; opacity or discoloration (white or brown) is visible at the entrance to the pit or fissure seen after prolonged air drying

Code 2 — Distinct visual change in enamel visible when wet, lesion must be visible when dry

Code 3 — Localized enamel breakdown (no clinical visual signs of dentinal involvement) when wet and after prolonged drying


Code 4 — Underlying dark shadow from dentin

Code 5 — Distinct cavity with visible dentin

Code 6 — Extensive (more than half the surface) distinct cavity with visible dentin
